A Message From THE 2024 - 2025 DISTRICT GOVERNOR

Rotary District 7570 | The Magic of Rotary



Fellow Rotarians and Friends,

When this Rotary year began under the theme *The Magic of Rotary*, I didn't realize how personally true that phrase would become. The magic wasn't in what we accomplished — though there is much to celebrate — but in how Rotary shaped us, challenged us and inspired us to become something more.

This year, our district found its heart in three deeply human places: in the call to strengthen boys' and men's mental health, in the pursuit of peace and conflict resolution and in the revitalization of civic life. We didn't just talk about these ideas — we lived them. We held conversations that mattered, launched Peace Pole projects that inspired and promoted the *Join or Die* documentary as a reminder that civic organizations like ours are essential to a healthy, connected society.

I didn't expect to become a peace advocate when I stepped into this role. But because of the vision of Rotary International President Stephanie Urchick, my experience at the Rotary Presidential Peace Conference, and the overwhelming enthusiasm our clubs showed for peacebuilding, I discovered that peace isn't just something we talk about — it's something we do. It starts at home. It extends to our clubs, our communities, our district, our nation and ultimately, to the world. Peace starts with us.

Rotary, more than any institution besides the United States of America itself, is the greatest peace-building and peace-making organization in the history of the world. Because peace cannot exist without clean water, a healthy environment, literate children, empowered women, thriving economies or a world free from polio. Every service project, every grant, every act of compassion contributes to that larger tapestry of peace. We also witnessed that spirit of service in action when Hurricane Helene struck. In the face of destruction, Rotarians did what Rotarians always do — we showed up. We rallied together to deliver relief, comfort neighbors and rebuild communities. That's the Rotary difference.

The year also tested us. Membership growth and engagement remain challenges, but even there we saw signs of renewal. Clubs experimented, adapted and reimagined what service looks like in today's world. We are finding new ways to tell our story — one that is both timeless and urgently needed — that Rotary gives people a place to belong, to serve and to lead.

Serving as District Governor has been one of the most transformative experiences of my life. I entered this role thinking I would lead an organization; instead, I found myself being shaped by it. Rotary made me a better listener, a more patient leader and — perhaps most unexpectedly — a champion for peace.

Thank you for allowing me to serve alongside you and to witness *The Magic of Rotary* made real — in every act of service, every hand extended and every seed of peace planted.

HISTORY

Chicago, IL, Rotary Club No. 1 was started on February 23, 1905. In due course Chicago helped to organize the Washington, D.C. Club, which in turn organized Richmond Rotary Club, in 1913, the 9th Rotary Club to be founded. The Washington, D.C. Club also was the parent club of Nashville, TN. Among the progeny of these two clubs are all the current Clubs of District 7570.

The Rotary Club of Roanoke, VA was organized by Richmond Rotary in 1914, so it is the oldest club in 7570, followed by Johnson City, TN founded by Nashville in 1916 with Lynchburg, VA and Bristol VA-TN following in 1917. One club in 7570 was sponsored by a club not from the district. Amherst was founded in 1939 by Blackstone, which was started by Richmond. Thus all clubs in the District are descended from either Richmond or Nashville.

From 1914 to 1917 four clubs organized. During the 1920s, twenty-five clubs were organized, our largest period of growth. The 1930s produced ten clubs, the 1940s two, and one each in the 1950, 1960 and 1970 decades. From 1983 to 1989 fourteen new clubs came into existence, while the decade of the 1990's saw eleven new clubs and fourteen clubs have joined our ranks since 2000. As of 2012 we have 83 clubs (and just over 3,300 members).

District 7570 started part of the 4th District of Rotary in 1914, comprising Virginia and the Carolinas. In 1923, South Carolina was removed and we became the 7th District which four years later it became the 56th District when North Carolina departed. In 1937 when a bit of Tennessee was added and the eastern part of Virginia separated, we became the 186th District. The District number was changed to 275 in 1949; to 757 in 1957, and to 7570 on July 1st, 1991.

From Greeneville, TN to Winchester, VA a distance of about 435 miles, north and south lying mostly west of the Blue Ridge Mountains, along the Shenandoah, James, Roanoke and Holston River valleys, District 7570 is truly a scenic district. Time and Interstate 81 has changed the District. Forty years ago it was a long day's drive from Greeneville to Winchester. Now it can be done in just about six hours.

Support of the Rotary Foundation and its programs has been a priority for District 7570. The District was 47th among all districts in support of the Polio Plus Program. Endowments in honor of William E. Skelton and Reid Jones have assets in excess of \$1.5 million to support the Ambassadorial Scholar program.

District 7570 has distinguished itself as a strong district actively involved in Rotary International. Edward R. Johnson(1935-36) of the Roanoke Club and William E. Skelton (1983-84) of the Christiansburg-Blacksburg Club served as Presidents of Rotary International. Edward R. Johnson (1933-34) and Eric E. Adamson (2009-10) of Front Royal served as Vice Presidents of Rotary International. In addition to the three leaders above, E. W Palmer (1939-40) of Kingsport, Irvin Cubine (1945-46) of Martinsville, and Edgar C. Hatcher (1996-98) of Bristol VA/TN served as Rotary International Directors.

District 7570 was selected as one of twelve to pioneer the new District Leadership plan. Several past district governors serve as a R. I. President's Representative to other District. Several of our members have been appointed to committees and task force groups of Rotary International.

THE MAGIC OF ROTARY COMES ALIVE IN BLACKSBURG

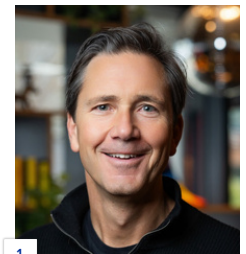
2025 DISTRICT CONFERENCE | THE INN AT VIRGINIA TECH | APRIL 3–6, 2025

The conference featured an incredible lineup of speakers who challenged, inspired and encouraged us to live Rotary’s values in new ways.

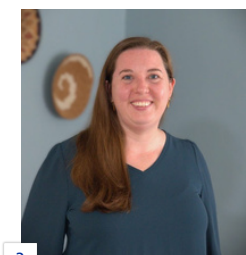

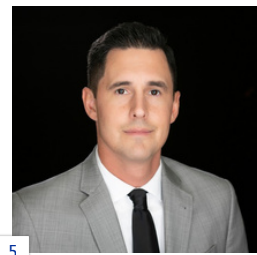

Back at the Inn, the fun continued with a mix of creative and social activities. Participants painted LOVE letters, crafted mini Peace Poles and enjoyed whiskey and wine tastings. Evenings were filled with music and laughter thanks to dueling pianos and a Beatles cover band, making it a celebration that lived up to its theme: *The Magic of Rotary*.

A GLOBAL CONNECTION

The conference concluded on Sunday morning with a surprise Zoom appearance from District 2485 Governor **Butrint Batalli** (Albania and Kosovo), marking the beginning of a new partnership between our districts. Together, DG Butrint and DG **Bret** committed to collaborate on peace-building and humanitarian projects that will make our world a better place to live.

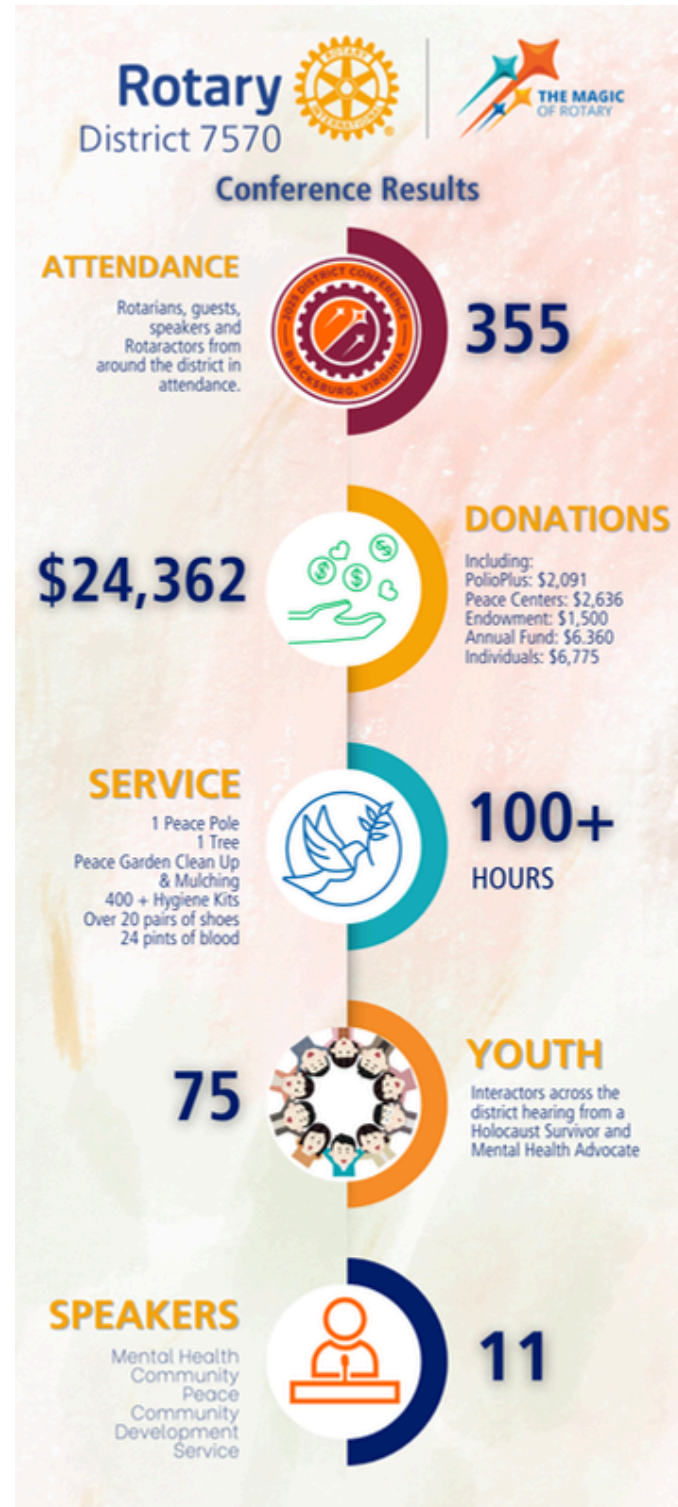

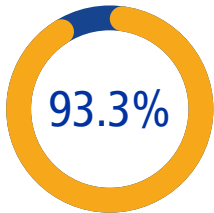

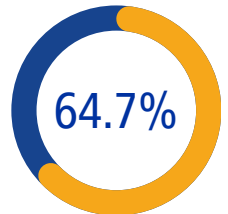

2024-2025 DISTRICT PROJECTS



CART

The CART Fund provides funds for research to cure Alzheimer's disease. CART started in 1996 with Rotarians voluntarily emptying their pockets and purses of change at weekly meetings. One hundred percent of donated funds go to cutting-edge Alzheimer's disease research. As of May 2021, CART has awarded \$10.2 million dollars in 60 grants to recognized US research institutions. During the RY 24-25, **21 clubs** gave **\$14,947.49**.

WHEELCHAIR FOUNDATION

During the RY 24-25, **District 7570 Rotarians contributed \$103,598** to the Wheelchair Project. These funds provided three containers—approximately **810 wheelchairs**—delivering mobility, independence and dignity to individuals in need around the world.

In addition, through collaboration with partner districts, District 7570 helped fund 200 specialized wheelchairs distributed in Ecuador. This effort was made possible through District Designated Funds (DDF) contributions from the following districts: District 7570 – \$9,000; District 7610 – \$5,000; District 7670 – \$5,000; District 4440 – \$1,000. Together, these combined efforts resulted in the purchase and distribution of **1,100 wheelchairs**, exemplifying the collective compassion and global reach of Rotary service.



END POLIO NOW TULIPS

During the 2024–2025 Rotary year, District 7570 once again partnered with District 1600 in The Netherlands for an End Polio Now Tulip campaign. Clubs and members across our district embraced the project, purchasing tulip bulbs whose proceeds go directly to PolioPlus. Thanks to their generosity, tulip sales in District 7570 generated **\$6,700** in contributions. A simple flower continues to sow hope. Together, we are growing a polio-free world.

ROTARY LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

During the Rotary year, **two Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) sessions** were successfully held—one in Kingsport, TN and one in Blacksburg, VA.

The RLI is a multi-district leadership and development program that engages Rotarians through interactive, small-group facilitation. The program's purpose is to strengthen clubs by equipping members with the tools, knowledge and confidence to become more effective leaders within Rotary and their communities.



DISTRICT 7570 YOUTH



Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)

More than **120 students** participated in engaging leadership activities, dynamic keynote sessions and a meaningful **Rise Against Hunger** service project at RYLA 2024. The event continues to inspire young leaders to embrace Rotary's values of service, leadership and fellowship.

Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE)

The District was host to three in-bound students. **Ivanna Ramirez Vivas** (Venezuela) was co-hosted by the **RCs of Abingdon and Washington County**. **Tomás Diaz Huenchur** (Chile) was hosted by the **RC of Lynchburg**. **Rut Thoren** (Sweden) was co-hosted by the **RCs of Blacksburg and Christiansburg-Blacksburg**.



Additionally we had three out-bound students: **Langston Berglund** (Peru) sponsored by the **RC of Staunton**; **Elias More** (Poland) sponsored by the **RC of Christiansburg-Blacksburg** and **Jonny Marcondes** (Japan) sponsored by the **RC of Strasburg**.

EarlyAct

The District concluded the year with **nine active EarlyAct Clubs**, an increase of three from the previous year. **Area One** led the way with seven active clubs, including all five Warren County Public Schools, thanks to the collaborative efforts of the **RCs of Front Royal and Warren County**. These clubs continue to build a culture of service and leadership among elementary students.

Interact

The District successfully updated and documented the official registration and contact information for all **22 Interact Clubs**. This critical work ensures students have greater access to Rotary opportunities such as RYLA and Youth Exchange. Interact **Chairman Kayla Payne's** efforts strengthened communication and support across our growing network of youth programs.

District Conference Youth Participation

More than **100 students** attended the **District Conference**, making it one of our most interactive youth events to date. Coordinated by **Julia Kogut**, **Nadine Johnson-Hamm** (both **RC of the Northern Shenandoah Valley**) and **Kayla Payne** (**Skyline Connections RC**), the program featured keynote speaker **Gregor Baum** and a large-scale hygiene kit service project. Each school—and the local **Rotaract Clubs of Virginia Tech and Radford**—took boxes of assembled kits back to their communities to help those in need, embodying the spirit of Rotary service in action.

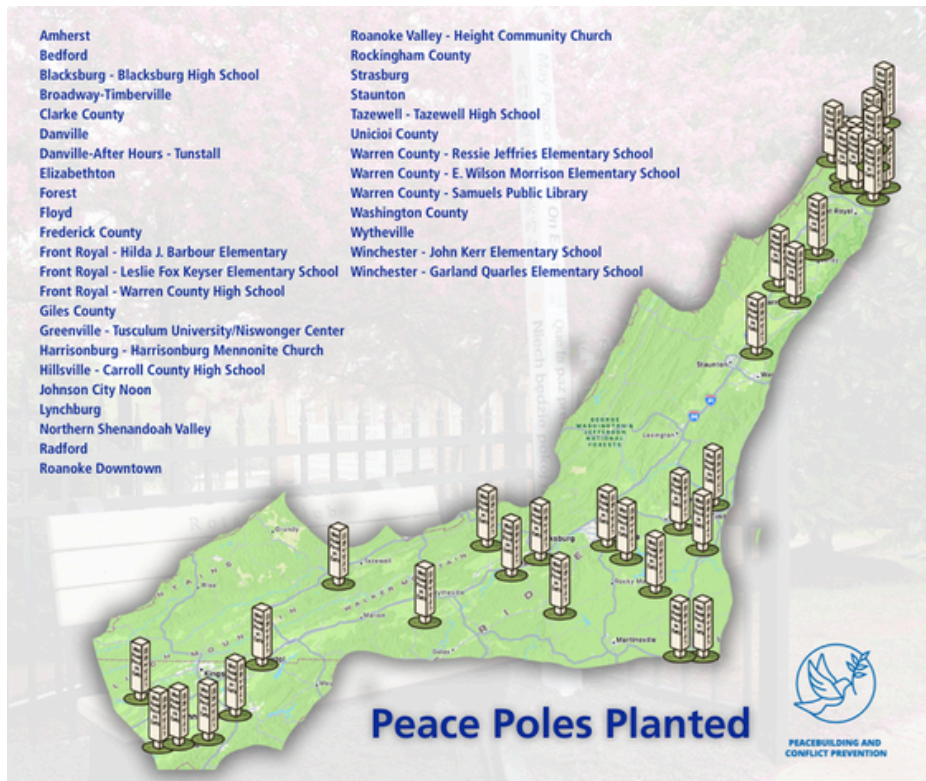
PEACE POLES

Grants are matching awards, where club funds are matched with DDF dollars—up to \$4,000 for single-club projects and up to \$12,000 for collaborative projects involving multiple clubs.

In partnership with Giles County and the Town of Pearisburg, VA, the **RC of Giles County** received a **\$2,050** grant to repair a community shelter at Whitt Riverbend Park in Pearisburg, VA.



Service Above Self



RC of Marion-Morning partnered with the Sentinel Foundation to support The Elk Heart “Carpenter’s Crossing Homecoming” Project in Avery County, NC. The project rebuilt a critical road destroyed by Hurricane Helene, restoring access and emergency services to three families who had been cut off from 911 response and essential infrastructure.

The **RC of Abingdon** received a **\$10,000** grant for its Damascus Flood Restoration and Economic Recovery Project. Working alongside the Town of Damascus, VA, Master Gardeners, and local Scouts, the club led restoration efforts at Laurel Creek Park, a vital community space featuring a stage, pavilion, benches, creek access and restrooms. Rotarians and volunteers provided hands-on support for cleanup, landscaping and the replanting of native vegetation to revitalize the park and ensure a safe, welcoming space for residents and the local Farmers Market.

The grant also enabled the Town of Damascus to purchase a generator to support the town’s emergency alert siren, strengthening local preparedness and resilience in future emergencies.

Local Relief

When Hurricane Helene struck, Rotarians across District 7570 quickly mobilized to support fellow Rotarians and communities devastated by flooding. With the assistance of the **RC of Warren County**, the District established a District Disaster Relief Fund to coordinate and direct recovery efforts locally.

From this fund we provided assistance with local aid workers to secure their equipment.

The fund raised more than **\$10,000**, providing resources for clubs to apply for grants to assist with rebuilding projects and community recovery efforts throughout the district. This initiative exemplifies Rotary’s spirit of service and solidarity—neighbors helping neighbors in times of need.



INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

Global Grants

Global Grants support large-scale international projects with sustainable, measurable outcomes in Rotary's Areas of Focus. By working together to meet real community needs, clubs and districts build lasting global partnerships and expand Rotary's impact around the world.



During the 2024–2025 Rotary year, District 7570 provided **\$20,000** in DDF to support a water and sanitation project in Ghana, coordinated by **Walter Hughes** of the **Salem Rotary Club**, with financial support from several District 7570 clubs. An additional **\$10,000** in DDF supported an eye surgery project in India, continuing a partnership with a Rotary district that hosted a past Group Study Exchange.

At the close of the year, District 7570 clubs were international partners in twelve active Global Grant projects across six countries—India, Jamaica, Uganda, Ecuador, Ghana and Ukraine—representing a combined total budget of **\$1,239,185**.

The District committed **\$16,000** in DDF to collaborate with more than 30 Rotary clubs and districts worldwide on a \$400,000 Uganda Village Savings Group Global Grant in partnership with VisionFund. This initiative will empower vulnerable women in rural Uganda through a Savings and Loan program, helping lift families out of extreme poverty.

GLOBAL GRANTS



In support of Rotary's commitment to end modern slavery and human trafficking, District 7570 further contributed **\$10,000** in DDF to a \$300,000 Global Grant aimed at reducing child sex trafficking in the Houston metropolitan area.

Additionally, a previous year's **\$15,000** grant to help fund District 7600's Chesapeake Regional Healthcare Mobile Clinic began in May.

New Global Grant Partnerships (2024–2025):

- **RC of Johnson City** partnered with a club in Ghana on an education project helping students prepare for national examinations that determine access to higher education. The district provided **\$20,000** in DDF toward the project's \$51,600 total budget.
- **RC of Blacksburg** became the international partner for an education project in India with a \$42,893 budget, supported by **\$10,000** in DDF.
- **RC of Lexington Sunrise** partnered on a wheelchair project in Ecuador, providing specialized mobility devices to individuals in need. The district contributed **\$9,000** in DDF toward this \$36,000 initiative, which also received DDF support from two other Rotary districts.

Through Global Grants, District 7570 continues to strengthen its global reach.

Each award provides **\$35,000** in funding for academic work aligned with one of Rotary's Areas of Focus, fostering global understanding, leadership and service.

Riley Wagner

Sponsored by the **RC of Waynesboro**, **Riley Wagner** is pursuing his master's degree at the Imperial College Business School, part of Imperial College London (United Kingdom). His studies explore the intersection of sustainable international development and climate change adaptation, seeking ways to help underserved communities grow while building resilience and transitioning toward a low-carbon future.

Riley currently works in London for BeZero Carbon, a global ratings agency for the Voluntary Carbon Market, assessing the credibility of carbon offsets much like S&P or Moody's evaluate financial instruments. A Princeton University graduate with a B.S. in Chemical and Biological Engineering, Riley also served as a Fulbright Research Fellow in Florianópolis, Brazil.

Deepshila Gautam

Sponsored by the **RC of Johnson City**, **Deepshila Gautam** of Nepal is pursuing her Ph.D. in Biomedical Science at East Tennessee State University, focusing on neuroscience research and serious mental illness, particularly schizophrenia. Her goal is to develop translational biomarkers that advance drug discovery for schizophrenia and related disorders.

After completing her doctorate, Deepshila plans to pursue a postdoctoral fellowship supported by the National Institute of Mental Health, deepening her expertise and preparing for future leadership roles in mental health research. She holds a Master's in Biology from ETSU and a B.S. in Pharmacy from Tribhuvan University in Kathmandu, Nepal.



Eirik Dahlgren

Sponsored by the **RC of Greenville**, **Eirik Dahlgren** is earning his MSc in Conflict and Cooperation at Stirling University in Scotland. His studies build upon his background in history and peacebuilding from Tusculum University, equipping him with the tools to analyze modern conflicts and develop strategies for reconciliation and stability.

Following graduation, Eirik plans to join the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) in its Bureau for Conflict Prevention and Stabilization, with aspirations to serve in regions such as the Middle East or Eastern Europe. He holds a B.S. in History and Museum Studies from Tusculum University.

Friendship Exchange

Under the leadership of chairman **Burt Duren (RC of Lynchburg-Morning)**, the Rotary Friendship Exchange (RFE) Committee was revitalized in 2024 after being dormant for several years due to the pandemic.

Burt assembled a dedicated committee representing all corners of District 7570: **Trish Cerulli (RC of Bedford)**, **Mari Jo Cochran (RC of Warren County)**, **Anna Lester (RC of Stuart)**, **Mikhail Mann (RC of Giles County)**, and **Cindy Winn (RC of Johnson City)**.

The committee has arranged a 2026 exchange with District 4640 in Paraná, Brazil. Interest was immediate and enthusiastic—within 48 hours, more than 30 Rotarians applied for just 12 available outbound positions.

District 7570 was also represented on the global stage when Burt moderated a breakout session at the Rotary International Convention in Calgary, titled "Achieving Awesome Friendship Exchanges." The session drew nearly 200 participants from around the world.



District 7570 FOUNDATION



In 2024, Rotary District 7570 established the Rotary District 7570 Foundation, Inc., a charitable organization created to initiate and support programs that directly benefit our District. The Foundation's mission is to strengthen local impact by providing grants, scholarships and financial support for Rotary initiatives across District 7570.

This new Foundation serves as a local philanthropic resource, designed specifically to enhance and sustain projects within our own District. For international efforts, we will continue to partner with The Rotary Foundation through contributions to the Annual Fund.

In addition to supporting ongoing programs, the District 7570 Foundation will play a key role in fundraising and disaster relief efforts. In the past, when our District needed to raise funds for local emergencies, we relied on individual club foundations. Now, with this new structure, the District can efficiently collect, manage and distribute funds for such causes directly.

The Foundation also provides a tax-deductible giving option for individuals, clubs and businesses wishing to support District-level initiatives—such as youth programs (RYLA, Interact and Youth Exchange) or District Conference programming.

The Foundation is governed by a Board of Directors composed of Past District Governors representing every area of District 7570 (see sidebar for list).

The Foundation's initial funding of **\$25,000** originated from the surplus of the 2022–23 District Conference. These funds will help launch several designated accounts to support key District programs and expand our collective capacity to *Unite for Good*.

Together, we can make the Rotary District 7570 Foundation a vital resource that empowers our clubs and members to serve more, give more and achieve more through Rotary.



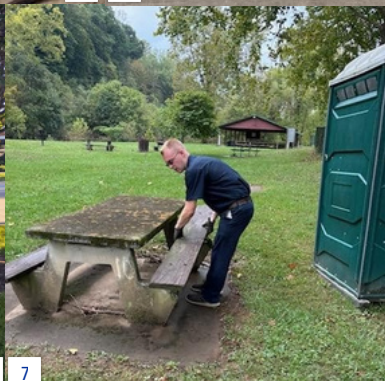
